Before Reading

- Look at the cover with your child. Ask questions about the picture: What are the characters doing? How might they be feeling?
- If your child has read other Arabia Readers stories, ask them about the characters and the other stories they remember.
- Look through the book together. Talk about the pictures. Ask: What can you see? Who is this?

While Reading


- Listen to your child patiently and encourage them to read aloud at their own pace.
- Give your child lots of encouragement. If they get stuck on a word, help them to break it down into sounds and then blend the whole word, e.g. ad-ven-ture, adventure.
- Tell your child a word if they really struggle to say it and blend the word. Move straight on, it's no big deal.


- Encourage your child to ask questions about the meanings of the words.
- Praise your child after reading tricky words. Make sure to ask them to say what the word means or to give an example of the word, so you can check that the understand the meaning and not just how to say it.

After Reading

- If you can remember the words that your child struggled with, try to practise them a little more:
- Go back and find the word in the book, point to it and ask your child to say and explain the word.
- Say to your child: Remember that it was a bit difficult to say (adventure)? Can you find it again in the book? Encourage your child to look back through the pages and find the tricky words.
- Do the activities on page 24 together.

Don't forget to tell your child how much you enjoyed reading with them!
